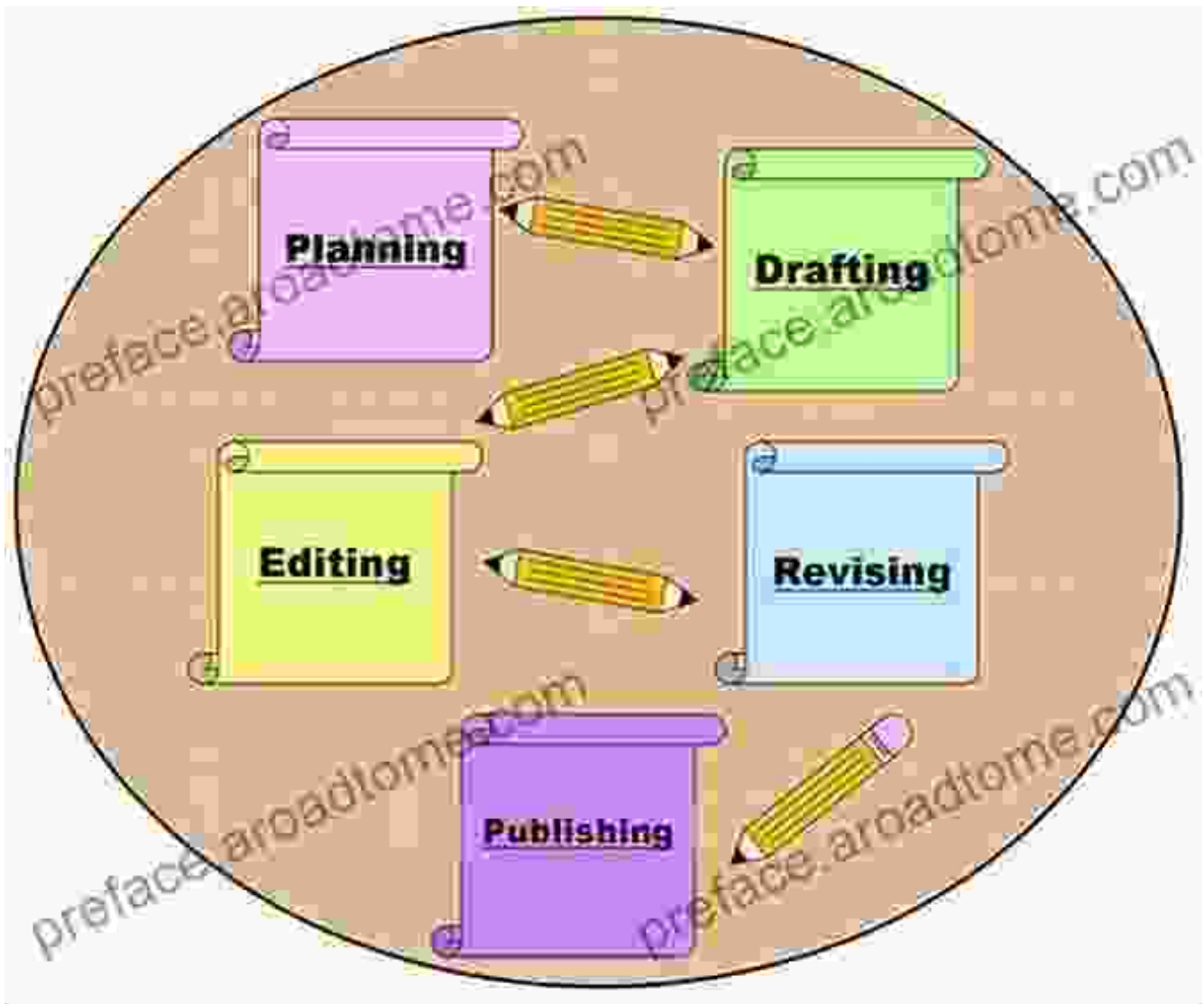

Narrative writing usually has a series of characters and is often written in first person narration which is where the story is narrated from the point of view of one person, although it can be done with more. The narrative text will also always feature a beginning, middle and end.

EXPOSITORY WRITING

OTHER TYPES OF WRITING

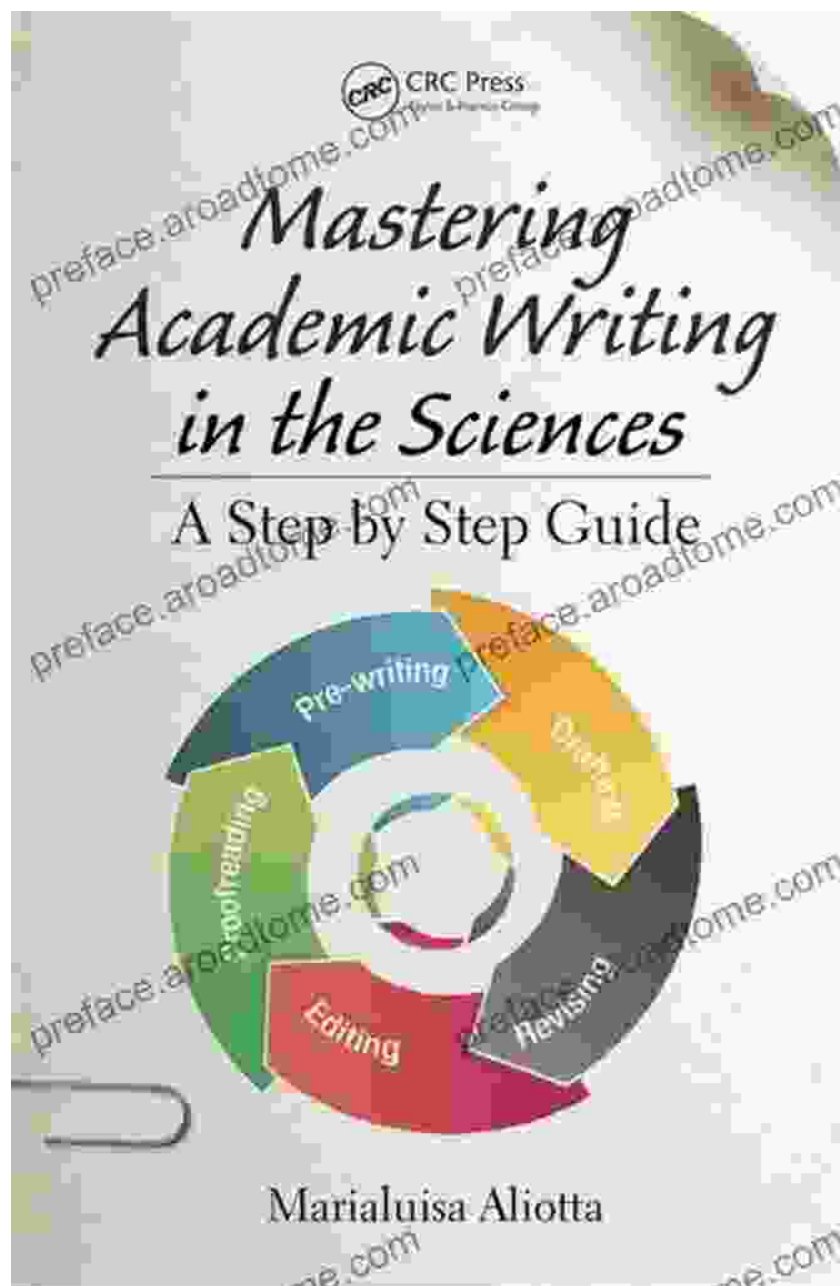
- **Objective writing** - this is a type of writing which the author is able to back up with data or facts and does not contain their personal views.

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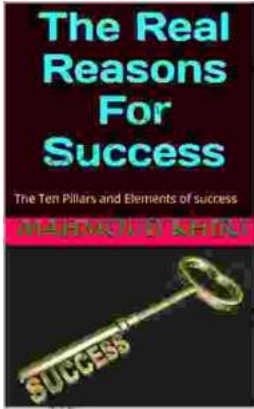
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
